Student Learning

Student Learning Progress - Term One

A Positive School Culture - Restorative Practice

Frankston Primary School builds all of our positive school culture through a deliberate act and design that flows through structure, policies, procedures and everyday interactions guided by the philosophy of Restorative Practice.

Four principles guide the implementation and embedding of restorative practices into every aspect of school life.

- A restorative school encourages staff and students to pursue respect for self, respect for others and respect for the environment.
- Equality and equity sit at the heart of the school's focus.
- Every person in the school community has a voice and has the right to be listened to and heard.
- Learning and development are grounded in relationship

Restorative schools create the context for school staff and students to co-create the conditions for the strengthening of relationships and rights as well as underpinning learning and teaching.

Restorative pedagogy refers to teaching which is imbued with the principles:

- Equality and equity
- Student voice and agency
- Relational learning and development
- Respect for self, others and the environment and reflection on adherence to restorative principles and practice.
- Social and emotional literacy
- Circle Time
- Conferencing between students when things 'go wrong' and students harm someone 'make a mistake'.

- Thorough school clean, including refreshed student toilets.


Two Weeks of Leave

Student Mobile Phone Policy

The Department of Education has in place a student mobile phone ban and requires all schools to ensure this ban is enforced from the start of the 2024 school year.

This policy applies to:

- All students at Frankston Primary School and on school grounds before and after school
- Students' personal mobile phones and other personal mobile devices such as smart watches etc brought onto school premises during school hours, including recess and lunchtime.

Definition:

- A mobile phone is a telephone with access to a cellular (telecommunication) system, with or without a physical connection to a network.
- For the purpose of this policy, 'mobile phone' refers to mobile phones and any device that may connect to or have a similar functionality to a mobile phone such as ipads and smart watches.

At Frankston Primary School:

- Students who choose to bring mobile phones or related devices to school must have them switched off and securely stored at the front school office on arrival on school premises.
- Students who choose to bring mobile phones or related devices to school are able to pick them up from the front office at the end of the school day after the 3.30pm bell has sounded.
- When emergencies occur, parents or carers should reach their child by calling the school's office directly.
- Where a student has been granted an exception, the student must use their mobile phone for the purpose for which the exception was granted, and in a safe, ethical and responsible manner.

Enforcement

- Students who use their personal mobile phones inappropriately at Frankston Primary School may be issued with consequences consistent with our school's existing Student Engagement, Bullying and Harassment and Student Management Policies.
- At Frankston Primary School inappropriate use of mobile phones is any use during school hours, unless an exception has been granted, and particularly use of a mobile phone: in any way that disrupts the learning of others; sending inappropriate, harassing or threatening messages or phone calls; engaging in inappropriate social media use including cyber bullying; capturing video or images of people, including students, teachers and members of the school community without their permission; capturing video or images in the school toilets, changing rooms, swimming pools and gyms.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE-LET'S DO IT!!

Frankston Primary School is striving to ensure that ALL our students are maintaining acceptable school attendance levels in order to access the education they rightfully deserve.

No matter how hard parents try, some students at times may be reluctant to go to school or families may feel that it is ok to give a child a 'day off'.

Addressing attendance issues promptly and setting up good attendance patterns can lead to future success and can help students feel more engaged and connected at school.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Patterns of late arrival at school or missing classes are early warning signs of disengagement from school
- Each day of absence has an impact on skill development and social connections
- Poor attendance may be associated with future unemployment, criminal activity, substance abuse, and poorer health and life expectancy.

WHAT YOU CAN DO TO AVOID POOR ATTENDANCE AT SCHOOL?

Generally:

- Act early if you are concerned
- Talk about the importance of showing up to school every day, make that the expectation.
- Regular attendance at school sets up good behaviours for regular attendance at future workplaces and other life commitments
- Don't let your child stay home unless genuinely sick. Complaints of headaches or stomach aches may be signs of anxiety
- Reward appropriate behaviour and don't unintentionally reward unwanted behaviour by letting children who stay home have access to their devices and the internet

Daily Routines and sleep

- Help your child maintain daily routines such as finishing homework and getting a good night's sleep.
- Primary school aged children need about 10 to 11 hours sleep.
- You may also need to monitor your child's use of the Internet, mobile phone and TV at night to
 ensure they are not staying up too late or being disturbed while sleeping
- Consider how your child is sleeping is their room cool and dark and have all devices, including TVs and mobile phones, been removed?

Talk about school

- Talk to your child. What are their feelings about school? What interests them at school?
- For younger children, talking about the school day shows your interest. Ask simple, positive and specific questions about parts of the day e.g. What was fun? Who did you play with today? Did you help anyone today?



Family holidays and appointments

- Try not to schedule hair, dental or medical appointments during school hours. Arrange family
 holidays during scheduled school holidays so that students don't miss out on classes and feel left
 behind.
- If it is necessary to be absent from school for an extended period make sure you discuss this
 with your child's teacher and talk about activities that your child may do whilst they are away to
 continue to support their learning.

School policies and monitoring attendance

- Familiarise yourself with the school's attendance policy. This can help when trying to reason
 with a child who is resisting going to school.
- Monitor your child's attendance and school performance. Periodically check with their teachers
 to find out how things are going. Your child's teacher can tell you exactly what your child's
 attendance percentage is.

Homework

 If your child wants to stay home to finish homework or an assignment, rather than letting them stay home, expect them to go to school – make attendance the number one priority.
 You can discuss later with them how they can improve their study habits to meet due dates.

SCHOOL REFUSAL

School refusing children experience significant emotional distress not only when going to school but also at the thought of going to school; they may be absent from school for weeks or even months at a time. School refusal differs from truancy as children generally stay home with the knowledge of the parents and despite their best efforts to encourage their child to go to school.

School refusal can be very distressing for parents who can find it very difficult to manage and address; it can cause conflict in the home and disrupt routines.

IMPORTANT THINGS TO REMEMBER

- Frankston Primary School wants to work in partnership with ALL parents act early if you have any concerns by contacting your child's teacher and asking for advice and support or organise to speak with Jo Booth (Wellbeing Leader)
- Remember there is no safe number of days for missing school each day a student misses puts them behind, and can affect their educational outcomes and their social connectedness
- Talk positively about school and the importance of attending every day
- Avoid making routine medical and dental appointments during the school day or planning family holidays during the term

WHAT DOES FRANKSTON PRIMARY SCHOOL USE TO MEASURE ATTENDANCE?

- Frankston Primary School use a DATA tracking system to identify all student's daily attendance. This data identifies students with increased absences and enables the school to compare individual student's yearly absence rates.
- The school's SMS system allows us to identify why a child is absent.

TO EXPECT IF YOUR CHILD'S ATTENDANCE IS FALLING BEHIND

Frankston Primary School WANTS to work with ALL parents to ensure that your child is attending school regularly however if your child is identified as needing to improve their school attendance, the following may occur:

- Your child's teacher or the Wellbeing Leader will contact you to discuss your child's absences.
- An Attendance Support Group Meeting will be arranged to formulate an Individual Attendance Improvement Plan with Parents/Carers and Wellbeing Officer/Principal/Classroom Teacher to assist with attendance improvement strategies.
- Ongoing absences despite intervention supports MUST be referred to the Education Department Regional Director.

Frankston Primary School will continue to commit to the following to ensure that ALL our students are given EVERY opportunity to attend school regularly:

- Create a positive school culture and effectively engage with families
- Communicate clear high expectations about learning & attendance
- Establish rewards & incentives for good attendance for our students
- Continually monitor & follow up ALL student absence

Let's all avoid these LOST OPPORTUNITIES for our students and remember the data below:

80% attendance rate is the equivalent of missing one day per week or 40 days per year or over 2/12 years P-12

85% = 30 days per year or 2 years P-12

90% = 1 day per fortnight or 20 days per year or over 1 year P-12

95% = 10 days per year and over half a year P-12

DID that just shock you? It makes you think twice about when your child is absent? I am really looking forward to seeing our students maintain fabulous attendance throughout 2024.


